Tiger Eye Protector Product – Removal from the Supply Chain in respect of Covid-19 Use

The Department for Health and Social Care have released a CAS alert for certain models of protective goggles and frames, which have been tested and do not meet the current requirements for splash protection and shouldn't be used in a Covid-19 setting. The details of the products concerned are below:

Tiger Medical Products: Protective Goggles and Frames

Product Codes PG0001 - F and PG0001-L

Barcode for Frames: 6948548400132; Barcode for Lenses: 6948548400224 NPC for Frames (BTP083 and BTP403) and Lenses (BTP097, BTP404 and BTP439)

Update from PHE Regarding Testing

There are ongoing efforts to resolve the issues in relation to Covid test results being reported back to care homes. Please continue to report any delays experienced when receiving your daily contact from your local authority and who will endeavour to liaise with PHE to resolve the issues.

Please be aware that there have been some issues relating to the mislabelling of specimens which is being amplified by the current scale and volume of activity at present. To help to rectify this problem please can care homes help by ensuring the specimens returned are labelled with the care home name and the iLOG number which allows the specimens to be linked back to the relevant home. PHE cannot identify that results are linked to specific homes without the care home name or iLOG labelled correctly. This is on the instructions provided with the kits.

Care Home and Dementia Team Update- Psychological Safety and Music for Wellbeing

Feeling safe as a team is really important at the moment: Psychological Safety is about creating a working environment in which everyone feels comfortable sharing their thought and concerns. This week we have a <u>poster</u> for your staff room and a <u>flyer</u> about a free support pack that will help you promote psychological safety within your team.

A free new online resource, which combines science and technology to provide a catalogue of soothing and calming music and videos, has been developed to support people who may feel anxious during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Recovery College Online and Trauma Informed Care teams have joined forces with music technology company X-System; Northumbria University and the Calm

PRINCIPLE Study

Individuals who have been diagnosed with or who are showing symptoms of COVID-19 and are aged 65 or over (or 50-64 with certain conditions) are able to self-enrol into the PRINCIPLE study. This is a national trial to find treatments that reduce hospital admissions and improve symptoms. To join the study, please follow this <u>link</u>.
