Demonstrates compliance with data protection legislation



Reviewed annually



Gives advice and is a checklist of good practice



Why is Data Security so important?

- Data and cyber security is important for safe sharing of records, especially with increased use of digital technology
- It will help you keep confidential information safe
- It will help protect your business from the risk of being fined for a data breach and from the consequences of a cyberattack




Why is Data Security so important?

- The DSPT will demonstrate compliance with legal and CQC requirements
- It's often a contractual requirement from Councils and CCGs to complete the DSPT
- The DSPT will be your passport to shared care records and other digital innovations, enabling you to be part of a joined-up care network with the interests of the people you support and care for at the heart of this





Multi location care providers can:

- Complete one DSPT and publish it for all CQC locations
 OR
- Complete one DSPT for each location

Things to think about:

- 1. Are the same induction and training arrangements followed?
- 2. Are policies and procedures the same in all locations?
- 3. Are there the same data security and data breach arrangements?
- 4. Are the IT arrangements the same for each location?

Yes – then all locations would have the same responses to the questions in the Toolkit and you can complete one DSPT.





- 1. Go to https://www.dsptoolkit.nhs.uk/Account/Register
- You will need a valid email address and your ODS (Organisation Data Service)
 - Choose which ODS code(s) to use depends on your organisational setup
 - Who will be your organisation's DSPT Administrator? Use their email address
- You must respond to the automated email within 24 hours and set up your password


Finding your ODS code
