### PA01 Suspected brain tumour in Children When to worry?

#### **General Points**

- Brain tumours are the second commonest cancer in childhood (after leukaemia), with 500 new cases diagnosed a year in the UK.
- Presenting symptoms vary depending on the location of tumour and the age of the child.
- 60% of survivors of childhood tumours have a residual neurological deficit (including blindness, hemiplegia and developmental impairment)

# Symptoms to look out for in the various age groups (2 or more present- URGENT REFERRAL)

#### Symptoms include:

Under 5/ Preschool	5 – 11 Children	12 – 18/ Young People
Persistent / recurrent vomiting	Persistent / recurrent headache	Persistent / recurrent headache
Balance / co-ordination / walking problems	Persistent / recurrent vomiting	Persistent / recurrent vomiting
Abnormal eye movements	Balance / co-ordination / walking problems	Balance / co-ordination / walking problems
Behaviour change, particularly lethargy	Abnormal eye movements	Abnormal eye movements
Fits or seizures (not with a fever)	Blurred or double vision	Blurred or double vision

#### Indications for referral

- Follow the headsmart guide to age-sensitive symptoms.
- Consider admission/ same day assessment for progressive symptoms via on-call Paediatric
- Urgent Referral to paediatrics for one or at most two symptoms
